ADULT NEWS



MEET OUR COMMUNITY

Following 21 years of service to the people of Shankill Dr. Patrick Irwin has decided to retire from General Practice on the 2nd May.

Last week I was privileged when Dr. Irwin generously gave of his time and invited me into his surgery to discuss his career to date and answer some questions I wanted to put to him.

Patrick Irwin, a native of Galway city, was the eldest of eight children born to Paddy and Dell (Dehlia) Irwin. A neighbour and childhood friend, Ann, later went on to become his wife. He

received his general education in Galway and later went on to NUI Galway where he trained to be a doctor.

As was common in those days his mother wanted to have a priest in the family but Pat decided that a doctor would be the next best thing.

I asked Dr. Irwin if anyone had influenced his decision to become a General Practitioner and he told me that he had been very impressed by a local GP Dr. McHale (there is a seat erected to him in Galway) who was a 'good old-fashioned' doctor who cared more for his patients than about making money.

Reading books about the lives of GP's also played a part in his decision, mentioning 'How Green is my Valley' as an example. But basically Pat always wanted to be a General Practitioner.

Following graduation in 1975 Pat spent 6 months as an intern on a surgical speciality in Limerick Regional Hospital. After that period there were no places available in Limerick to enable the completion of his training and Pat moved to Preston in England where he successfully completed his training. Thereafter followed 4 years specialist training to become a General Practitioner both in Preston and Bolton.

Once qualified as a General Practitioner Pat commenced working as a GP in Stillington, Stockton-on Tees and remained there for 10 - 12 years before returning to practice in Ireland. Pat was very much in favour of the English medical system where everyone is treated equally and no money changes hands between patient and doctor. Some of the best doctors he knew were those he met during his time in England.

During his time in England Pat lost contact with Ann but on a return visit to Ireland their relationship was re-established and marriage followed. Ann and Pat returned to England where their first son Padraig was born.

Pat always wanted to return to work in Ireland and that wish was fulfilled approximately 22 years ago. He saw an advertisement in a paper for a small practice in Shankill which he was successful in acquiring. Pat, Ann and their family of two children moved into the house where the present surgery is and commenced practising in a small way. The surgery was in the front room and the family occupied the rest of the house.

Also at this time his now receptionist Mags came to work for the family. She was indispensable to the family helping Ann with the children and also when necessary greeting the patients on their visits to the surgery. Ann's help was vital to the development of the practice.

At that time Dr. McCusker was the other GP in the village and almost everyone attended his surgery. Although Shankill was a small, quiet village at the time the nearness of the Shopping Centre brought the presence of the surgery to the attention of the inhabitants.

The practice which was and is a family practice was run single-handedly initially and took quite some time to build up. It was about 5 years before Pat felt that he was finding his feet and 10 years before he really felt secure. Pat acknowledges that without the help of

Ann and Mags he might not have stuck it out. The total income for the first year was £2,000. (In comparison a General Medical Practice in England would have been paid more in one month). In Ireland Pharmacy practice was much more profitable than GP practice.

As the practice grew an extension was put on to the house for the surgery and eventually the family moved to their own home in Shankill and rented out the top floor to tenants.

At that time GPs worked long hours Monday to Friday and also provided a surgery on Saturday mornings until 12 midday. All outside hours were covered by a rota of GPs within a defined geographical area. Pat joined a walking group and if he was not on-call on a Sunday went walking on the Wicklow Way which provided relaxation after a long weeks work. Later on he took up golf and now plays off a modest handicap. Ann is also a golfer and sometimes joins him on the golf course.

As the size of the surgery increased Pat was anxious to take on a partner in the practice and although it took a long time he is now happy to have a husband and wife team take over the practice and grow it in line with the HSE Development plans for Primary care teams. Pat believes that one of the best ways forward in planning for the future lies in the provision of medical cards for everyone.

On asking Pat if he had prepared himself for retirement in any particular way he said that he hadn't but had first started thinking about it some years ago when one of his sons was seriously ill. His son made a full recovery but it was an extremely stressful time for Ann and himself. Both sons are now in college pursuing their own career paths but neither of them is following him into the medical profession.

Pat's main regrets are around the lack of involvement in the future of the practice but mainly he will miss the people - partners, staff and the many patients he has come to know over the years. One thing he will not miss is the paperwork.

Besides playing golf Pat is a social member of the National Yacht Club and hopes to develop his interest in sailing of which he has done a little. Winter golf breaks may also feature in the future. Pat has always said he would like to buy a vintage car -' just to get from A to B'; so watch out for your former GP gliding elegantly down the main street in his vintage motor in the future!

I wish to thank Dr. Pat for all his years of caring for the sick and needy in Shankill and wish him and Ann many happy years as they open a new chapter in their lives together.

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




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SHANKILL CLASSICAL MUSIC CLUB

Spanishry, literature and more

We were sad to learn of the recent death of Mary O'Rourke, a member for several years. She introduced two or three most interesting and well researched programmes, sometimes with the help of her husband, Richard. Mary had a huge knowledge of music and clearly loved to impart this to others. May she rest in peace.

MARCH AND APRIL 2012 MEETINGS

Twenty-four pieces, twenty-one composers, four presenters: there was no lack of variety at the March and April meetings of the Shankill Classical Music Club. The Spanishry turned up in both halves of the March session, presented by Sheila Thomson and Triona McGarry, in the form of a violin piece by Sarasate, a solo guitar piece by Turina and the spectacular Alborada del Gracioso for full orchestra by Ravel. The sunshine of the Sarasate habanera gave way to the chillier waters of the Scottish Isles, in a strikingly atmospheric choral setting by Michael Tippett of the familiar Over the Sea to Skye. Solo voices surfaced in an aria by Donizetti and songs by Grieg and by Schubert (the well-known Ave Maria). A complex fugal finale from an early string quartet by Haydn, a Brandenburg concerto by Bach, a piano concerto movement by Beethoven, a thumping scherzo from a Bruckner symphony, and the languid flute of Debussy's Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune all contributed their differing moods and textures to a varied mix. And the less said about Triona's yodelling surprise piece the better!

For the April session, Bruno Orsi and John O'Hagan drew on music inspired by literature. Bruno concentrated on music associated with the many Shakespeare plays set in Italian cities. So we had grand romantic tragedies set in Venice, in the form of a love duet from Verdi's Othello, and in the Verona and Mantua of Romeo and Juliet (the searing Death of Juliet scene from Prokofiev's ballet). There was




lighter relief in movements from a suite of incidental music to the Merchant of Venice by Arthur Sullivan (of G&S fame), and a colourful and engaging orchestral overture on The Taming of the Shrew (Padua and -again - Verona) by the splendidly named Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco (more

William Shakespeare Spanishry!).

Bruno's programme had begun with another Verona reference, the setting by Schubert of the song "Who is Sylvia" from Two Gentlemen of Verona. Not surprisingly, Schubert lieder turned up again in John's half of the programme, devoted to Goethe. This was the famous song Gretchen am Spinnrade from Faust, which the seventeen year old Schubert launched on a startled Vienna in October 1814. There were also romantic songs by Schumann and Tchaikovsky (how many of us knew that the famous None but the Lonely Heart is to a Goethe text?), and two versions of the frivolous Sorcerer's Apprentice: a vocal setting by Loewe of the original ballad, and the familiar (from Disney's Fantasia) orchestral tone-poem by Dukas. Romantic opera turned up in an aria from Massenet's Werther, and the evening ended with the final movements from the incidental music by Beethoven for the grand tragedy of the patriotic hero *Egmont*.

Fish is easy to cook and good for your health

Everyone knows that fish is good for you. The fats found in fish are thought to help our circulation and prevent heart disease. This is especially true for fish like salmon, tuna, mackerel and sardines, which are rich in fish oil (omega-3). New evidence suggests they can even aid in preventing diseases like Alzheimer's and Strokes. But it seems that many people are afraid of cooking fish at home since we eat twice as



much fish in restaurants as we do at home. Buying, storing, and cooking fish isn't difficult; it just requires a little knowledge.

BUYING FISH

Smell it! Fresh fish should smell sweet and fresh: you should feel that you're standing at the ocean's edge. Any fishy or strong odours means the fish is not at its best. Fresh fish is moist and delicious.

Look at it! Whole fish should look as if they had just come out of the water - bright eyes and firm flesh are signs of freshness. Fish fillets or steaks should be firm and bright looking, with no brown spots or discolouration.

Freeze it! Fresh fish should be stored in your refrigerator for only a day or two; it's very perishable. If you need to keep it for longer than that, wrap the fish well in freezer paper and a freezer bag and freeze it. Unless you live near a coast with a reliable supply of freshly caught fish, most fish that you buy will be sold frozen. Keep it frozen until you're ready to cook it. Fish can be thawed in the refrigerator, or under cold running water, or in the microwave. Be sure to cook it as soon as it has thawed.

What about bones? Many fish, including trout and salmon, have a double rib cage, so the fillets may have small pin bones. You can remove these by pressing the flesh with your fingers, and removing the bones using a tweezer. If you find this hard to do yourself ask your fishmonger to remove any bones for you. You can have the skin removed too if you wish. It usually costs a little bit more but may be worth it to have the fish ready to cook.

A convenient way to buy fish is pre packed and ready for the oven. This is usually in the chilled food cabinet and is ready to put in the oven or microwave – follow the cooking instructions on the pack carefully. This way you will not have to handle the fish and reduce the likelihood of smells in the kitchen.

PM O'Loughlin Foods in the Barbeque Centre, Shankill has fresh fish delivered every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. For a bigger variety of fish, check out the Coal Harbour outlet in Dun Laoghaire.

TO MARINATE, OR NOT?

Marinating fish adds flavour and moisture to the flesh, but it should only be marinated for a short time. If fish sits in acidic ingredients for more than 30 minutes, the acid will begin to break it down and you will have a mushy fish when it's cooked. Even richer fish like salmon and tuna should only be marinated for about an hour.

To make a marinade combine vegetable oil with an acidic ingredient like chopped tomatoes, red wine vinegar or lemon juice, and season with salt and pepper. Depending on your taste, other seasonings can be added such as fresh thyme leaves, parsley, chopped jalapeno peppers or crushed red pepper flakes.

DON'T OVERCOOK!

There's a delicate balance between perfectly cooked fish and overcooked fish. First of all, remember the principle of residual heat: a pan will hold heat when it's removed from the heat source and continue to cook the food for several minutes. For best results, cook fish until it's almost done, then remove the pan from the oven, microwave, stovetop or grill and let it stand for a few minutes to finish cooking. Because fish has very little connective tissue and fat, it is quite delicate when cooked. A reliable way to test if the fish is cooked is to see if the fish 'flakes'. Insert a fork or knife gently into the thickest part of the fish and twist. The flesh should begin to separate easily.



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

PROGRESS REPORT ON LAND BETWEEN STONEBRIDGE ROAD & PEDESTRIAN LIGHTS AT ST. ANNE'S CHURCH

Question: Councillor C. Smyth "To ask the Manager for a progress report on the work that is planned to take place on the area of land between the junction of Stonebridge Road and the Pedestrian Lights at St. Anne's Church in conjunction with the Council and Shankill Tidy Towns?"


Reply: "The 6 decorative public lighting columns and lanterns for the scheme have been ordered in December 2011 as there is a long delivery period on these. Subject to the delivery of these, it is intended to proceed with this work in February / March."

FLOODING ON ROAD/FOOTPATH at the pedestrian access from Quinn's Road on to the green area on Corbawn Drive

The contractor of the pipe laying has been made aware of drainage issues in this area and will liaise with drainage department when re-laying road surface. He has agreed to install new gullies if required, and if agreed with Drainage Dept. Contact: Michael Mangan, Senior Engineer, Projects Office

NIGHT TIME LIGHT FROM SHANGANAGH WASTEWATER TREATMENT WORKS

The Contractor (SDD Ltd.) for the new Wastewater Treatment Works at Shanganagh is obliged under the contract to ensure that all external site lighting is suitably designed to minimize and limit spill light interference to adjacent properties. Since the introduction of the new lighting, surveys have been undertaken on two occasions to determine the level of lighting. On both occasions, tests were carried out at night time with readings taken using a lux meter at various locations around the site boundary

Readings were taken first with all site lighting switched off and then with the site lighting switched on to establish the spill from the site. The level of lighting recorded on both occasions was significantly below what is regarded as nuisance level.

Notwithstanding the above, SDD have recently adjusted the multi-directional lighting pole in the middle of the site so as to minimise any light spill to adjacent properties. Contact: Michael Mangan, Senior Engineer, Water Projects Office


KILOMETRE MARKING ROUTES WITHIN SHANGANAGH PARK

O'CALLAGHAN WELCOMES € 30m SPORTS CAPITAL FUNDING

The Labour Party Cllr for BALLYBRACK/SHANKILL, Denis O'Callaghan has welcomed the announcement of a \in 30m fund for sports clubs and organisations to upgrade their facilities over the next four years. The fund is currently open to applicants who can receive grants of up to \in 300,000 to upgrade facilities or pitches or to purchase equipment.

"This is the first round of Sports Capital Funding in four years, and while the fund may be less than in other years, applicants only have to raise 15 per cent in 'matching funding' which is half of what was required in previous years, while those in Clár and RAPID areas only have to raise 10 and 5 per cent respectively. There is also better value to be had and the funding will stretch much further than it would have in the boom times.

"Any club in the Ballybrack Electoral Area which includes Shankill, Old Connaught and Rathmichael areas can apply for the funding and even more clubs than ever before will benefit as the rules on land ownership have been relaxed. This means that not all applicants have to own the land or have it on a long lease as was previously required.

"The provision of this funding demonstrates the government's commitment to providing quality sporting facilities to the many clubs across Ireland that play such a central and vital role in local communities. The funding will also create much needed employment.



COUNCIL INVITES IN STAKEHOLDERS FOR FURTHER DEBATE AROUND BEACH BYE LAWS

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council has announced that following a period of public consultation on Draft Bye Laws proposed to amend the existing regulations regarding the control of dogs on beaches, a range of interested parties will be invited into County Hall to engage in further debate around the issue.

Under the current bye-laws "no person shall take or allow to enter on a beach any animal which is under their ownership or control during the hours of 10.00 a.m. and 7.00 p.m. June to September inclusive." At all other time dogs must be kept on a leash. Under the new Draft Bye-Laws it is proposed that dogs will be allowed off-leash outside of the designated bathing areas at certain times, which is less restrictive than the current regulations.

A spokesperson for DLR says that the Council "is delighted to see a very real engagement with the consultation process, which has generated almost 600 submissions representing a wide and diverse range of opinions." The Council is proposing to invite in a number of stakeholder groups selected from these submissions, to present their views to a meeting of one of the Council's Strategic Policy Committees in June. The Strategic Policy Committee comprises Elected Members of the Council as well as representatives from various interest groups in the County.

The Shankill Tidy Towns committee have requested some improvements be made to the approach to Shankill Village. Following a number of meetings a scheme layout has been agreed and funding identified. If you wish, we can give you a brief on the planned improvements on Monday afternoon before the Area Committee Meeting.

The scheme involves conversion of some of the large paved areas to grassed areas, on one side of the Stonebridge Road at the junction with the Dublin Road,

and along the Dublin Road from Station Road to the pedestrian crossing opposite St.Annes Church. Some upgrades to public lighting and tree planting, and renewal of footpaths will be carried out. It is also proposed for Dublin Bus to provide an upgraded shelter within the scheme, and DLRCC will provide some cycle parking adjacent to the bus stop.

This is a very small scheme, but will improve the visual impact of the gateway into Shankill village.

Further to informal discussion recently, as this is a scheme proposed by the Shankill Tidy Towns Committee and commented on and facilitated by various sections within DLRCC (Parks, Public Lighting, Roads Maintenance, Traffic, etc.) we are writing to the Tidy Towns Committee to ask them to liaise directly with affected residents.


This will afford them the opportunity to put forward their reasons for the scheme, to discuss the concerns of those immediately affected, and to find some common ground agreeable to all.


The proposals should be reasonably representative of the local population.

We will ask that they

meet to discuss this over the next two weeks, and will keep you informed of the outcome. We can certainly arrange for a meeting to be held on site the week of 23rd April to either discuss amendments to their plan or to address any lingering concerns, etc.

Remember that all contractors installing alarms should be

them. It is important that alarms are set even when in the house and especially at night or when outside i.e. gardening for long periods. The checklist is just to get householders thinking, when they are doing checklist and upgrading security that they should also think fire safety as well, no point

in locking yourself into the house and in the event of fire not being able to get out. All homes should have a smoke alarm installed.

There is also an issue with older people being targeted in neighbouring Garda districts with various types of bogus callers offering building work, services, selling bed linen and claiming HSE will refund them, this is not the case. We haven't had this type of incident locally recently that we are aware of, but this is one of the aims behind the message in a bottle initiative in March edition to prevent these types of crime.



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Champions of Hope Transform Lives in Uganda

Champions of Hope is an initiative started last year by a group of 10 year children from old Crinken Church who have a real heart for children without water around the world and who declare 'It's Not Fair'. Over 1.1 billion people have no access to safe drinking water. The crisis is worst in places like Uganda where 2 in 5 people lack safe water. A baby here is 520 times more likely to die from diarrhoea than one born in Ireland.



Crinken Church's 10 year old Champions of Hope first burst into action in 2011 when they

managed to raise enough money to fund the drilling of two wells by Fields of Life. They have repeated their fundraising efforts in 2012 raising money by washing cars, organising bake sales, participating in sponsored runs and running a mini market that itself raised more than \in 1200. Most impressively the 10 year olds have donated their own money raised by giving up something particularly important to them over the Lenten period. On Sunday April 1st they walked the mile from Shankill Village to Crinken Church carrying bottles of water as a symbolic gesture. Many Ugandan children face treks of up to 10 kilometres daily to fetch water that is often contaminated. Following the walk, a cheque for \in 5,093 was presented to Richard Spratt, CEO of Fields of Life. Since then, that amount has risen to \in 5,450!

To our delight, Richard showed us images of the well that was drilled last year. For the first time in her life, Sarah,

aged 72, had clean, disease-free water to drink. It is with this image in mind that we look forward to next year to see how we as a community can impact the lives in Uganda through our small sacrifices.

Here are some of the comments from the children having completed the project:

'We read Isaiah Chapter 58 and I learnt to really think about the poor', Dave, 11

'It has changed me to think of others before myself,' Jacob, 11.

'The well project has taught me not to take water for granted', Calvin, 11

'The best thing about doing this was the sense of saving lives while having fun', Jasmin, 12.

Fields of Life operates in some of the poorest areas in East Africa. Since 1995

it has built 103 schools, 4 health centres and drilled more than 180 wells. Trevor Stevenson, the founder of Fields of Life and now Rector of Crinken Church, said "It is amazing and very inspiring to see what a group of 10 year old kids have achieved and particularly the personal sacrifices they have been prepared to make. Their efforts have literally transformed the lives of 150 households in four villages, in one of the poorest areas on the face of the planet". The goal of Fields of Life is to drill 1,000 wells by 2019, with the aim of bringing safe, clean water to 1 million people. 

Mitchell O'Connor raises concerns over development of Cherrywood

New villages could have negative impact on established areas like Dun Laoghaire, Shankill, Ballybrack, Dalkey, Blackrock, and Glasthule. Fine Gael Dun Laoghaire Deputy, Mary Mitchell O'Connor, has made a submission to Dun Laoghaire / Rathdown County Council outlining concerns over the impact the Cherrywood Strategic Development Zone could have on Dun Laoghaire and the surrounding areas.

"The Draft Planning Scheme for the Cherrywood Strategic Development Zone details a 264 hectare green field site for development which would consist of three new villages, served by a town centre, with the capacity for three primary schools and two post primary schools.

It is a cause of genuine concern that this massive development will have a detrimental effect on towns such as Dun Laoghaire, Shankill, Ballybrack, Dalkey, Blackrock and Glasthule if this proposal gets the go ahead. Whilst it may have been a good idea to rezone this land in 2009 this is now not sustainable given that shops and businesses are under huge pressure to operate in these difficult trading times.

"Consideration must also be given to how a major population move to Cherrywood will impact on house prices and school pupil numbers in the already established centres. In the last months alone a private primary school has closed in Dun Laoghaire town and I am aware of four other State primary schools in the Dun Laoghaire Electoral Area Ward that are set to lose significant pupil numbers. There is also pupil capacity in a number of our state run Secondary Schools in the area.

"The water supply to the development is also a cause for concern as the security of supply from Roundwood Water Treatment Works which Cherrywood area is totally reliant upon may not sustain a development of this scale.

"For too long planning authorities have acceded to short term plans because of commercial expediencies to developers. We must ask ourselves if this development is the best strategy for this area at this time. We already have an oversupply of unfinished office blocks and apartment units, many of which are empty, in places such as Leopardstown. It is my strong belief that we should get our existing towns back up and running before embarking on new developments such as this."

€55,000 in funding for Dun Laoghaire will help tackle litter and graffiti

Fine Gael TD Mary Mitchell O' Connor for Dun Laoghaire has welcomed funding totalling \in 55,000 for Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown to help tackle the problem of litter and graffiti. The funding has been announced by the Minister for Environment, Phil Hogan, as part of the provision of more than \in 2 million in grants to local authorities nationwide.

"A total of \in 35,000 has been allocated to Dun Laoghaire -Rathdown under the Anti-Litter and Anti-Graffiti Awareness Scheme. Using this money, local authorities will be able to select projects that promote greater public awareness and education in relation to litter and graffiti. This includes supporting voluntary initiatives run by community groups, which play such a vital role in the upkeep of our towns and villages.

"We all have a role to play in the upkeep of our own communities. Local authorities, community and voluntary groups all do excellent work to maintain the appearance of streets, roads and scenic areas; this funding from Minister Hogan will help to support them in this work."




