Together in Parenting Course

Together in Parenting is a new initiative that is being organized by the Shankill Churches Together- St. Anne's, Rathmichael and Crinken.

Following the Parenting Teenagers Course and Parenting Childrens' Courses that were run last year (with over 160 local parents attending them) there were many requests for an ongoing support network for parents in Shankill.

The plan is to encourage and support each other in the important role of parenting and raising our children and teenagers in our community through courses, practical seminars/discussions and parent/child activities.

May will see a national green ribbon campaign to spark conversations and get people talking openly about mental health in schools, workplaces and around kitchen tables in homes. Below are details of our first 'Together in Parenting" evening when we will deal with good and bad

aspects of mental health for our children and teenagers including concern around self-harm and suicide. We will get professional information and guidance from our speaker **Heather Moore** who has many years

experience as a practicing psychotherapist. Heather has worked in Pieta House (The Centre for the Prevention of Suicide & Self Harm) counseling teenagers struggling with suicidal ideation and self-harming behaviors. One of her main areas of specialty is working with adolescents and a large focus of her work in suicide prevention involves working with amilies. The evening will be informal and

informative. Lets support each other as we learn to parent through the escalating challenges of mental health in our adolescents and teens.

UNLEASHED DOGS

Dear Editor — Unfortunately I am writing this email to you with feelings of disappointment and disbelief at certain people's behaviour and attitude within our community.

I am a regular in Shanganagh Park and feel so privileged to such a wonderful park on my door step, however, since having my little boy nearly three years ago I have found going to the park a rather stressful encounter, this is due to the insistence of irresponsible dog owners who repeatedly choose not to adhere to the many signs stating very clearly that DOGS MUST BE KEPT ON A LEAD AT ALL TIMES.

I just can not understand why they feel that they have the right to ignore the signs and inflict their dogs on everybody else

They leisurely walk around the park with their dogs running

loose while young children are walking or playing, every time I am with my son a dog will run up to us which frightens him - whilst the dog owner says "its okay he loves children" well had they ever thought that my son might not love dogs and may have an allergy, or may have had an frightening experience with a dog in the past or simply he doesn't want a dog coming up to him while he is playing, especially when the dog should be on a lead and that we as tax payers paid for a lovely large dog walking pen in the park which is 98% of the time empty!

If you are a responsible animal loving dog owner please keep your dogs on a lead as an incident could easily happen which could result in a child getting hurt by your dog which could potentially see the poor animal being destroyed and as an animal lover myself I don't see why the dog should suffer just because its owner did not read the signs!!

DOG DIRT

"...Following the work you have been able to have done on "upgrading" the appearance of the approach to the village, I wonder whether you would consider tackling the matter of dog-fouling on our pavements?..."

I have asked DLR what they may be able to do and I gather that they could supply notices and bins, if they were thought appropriate by their engineer, Also, it seems to me that since grass has replaced the asphalt at our gateway (Dublin Rd) there is more dog-dirt left on the "grass" than when it was concrete. Is this progress?

DOGS ON FOOTPATHS

Some people are so thoughtless!!! Imagine if you are partially sighted or blind (as several of our residents are) and you are walking along a footpath with your guide dog. Suddenly another dog bounces up and is either aggressive, or just wants to be friendly. The guide dog is trained to ignore the intruder into its territory but the interfering dog does not know

this. Then there is a voice – "Come here now, Rex!" Rex may or may not obey. "He's only being friendly," says the voice!

Even if the offending dog is walking along quietly it doesn't know the person in its way is blind and is therefore unaware of its presence. This scenario could lead to the dog being inadvertently kicked, or worse, the blind person being tripped and falling.

If you don't keep your dog on a lead on the footpath, or any public place, you are breaking the law.

BARKING DOGS

It has come to our attention that some residents of Shankill are concerned about dogs constantly barking, both during the day and at night. This is obviously not acceptable behaviour on the part of both the dogs and their owners for letting them. Excessive barking which causes a nuisance to any person is an offence

What's to be done? In the first instance, in a good-neighbourly manner, let the dog's owners know how the

barking affects you. It is stressful for you and if you have small children it can keep them awake. They may not have realised what was happening. Do you know if any of your other neighbours are bothered by the barking? Perhaps you could ask them to sign a petition to hand in to the owners.

If that approach fails, a complaint about excessive barking should be made to the District Court. To do this, you must first inform the dog owner in writing using a prescribed form, which can be obtained from the local authority – in this case Dun Laoghaire Rathdown Co Co.


"Voices from the Great Houses: Cork and Kerry"

Some Tips for Writing a Good EV

In today's difficult employment market it is vital that the presentation of your CV encourages the prospective employer to read it. Here are some tips to help you write a good CV.

Your CV must be relevant to the job you are applying for. It needs to be strong and really targeted at that job. Ensure that your CV is honed to suit each job you apply for - not just one size fits all

- Create a profile tell them a little about the kind of person you are and what you have to offer - at the start of the CV.
- Summarise your skills and explain why you want the job and what you want from it.
- List your skills in bullet points and be sure to list your IT skills
- Remember that any experience you have, whether it is in employment or in casual or voluntary work may be relevant. That weekend job could have involved handling money, problem solving, dealing with customers, working as part of a team - all of this is relevant experience. Your work with the local Youth Club or Sports organisation may also demonstrate relevant leadership, time management and supervisory skills. For example - if you are applying for a Marketing job – your part-time job in the local shop during school / college gave you an insight into what sells and when. If you are applying for a job in Finance - your experience in dealing with customers, handling cash and stock is relevant.
- Try to match what you are saying to the language in the Job Spec – you want to show that you can do the job and that you understand what is required
- Phrases such as "I have an understanding of....", enable you to show that you can carry out the duties of the job even though you might not have much practical experience in the
- References should really be tailored to the particular job you are applying for. Therefore it is better to say that you would be delighted to provide references on request. You can then tell your referees about the particular job you are applying for so that their comments will demonstrate your suitability for it.
- · Always check your spelling and grammar. Do NOT rely on Spellcheck. Remember that the spellcheck will not identify the use of a wrong word if it is a word that is spelt correctly. Always ask someone else to read over what you have written. Employers complain about the number of CVs they receive with incorrect spellings, incorrect use of words and bad grammar. (Example: curb and kerb - both spelt correctly but with very different meanings)
- Put effort into preparing and sending well prepared CVs for two or three jobs per week, rather than using a generic CV to apply for 20 jobs and hoping for the
- When you get to the Interview you need to demonstrate that there is consistency between what you said in the CV and how you answer questions at the interview Good Luck.



Over the year we try to do a range of Hikes, some easy and some which are more challenging. We also try to do at least one overnight and then we have our annual camp to round off the year.




BEAVERS

THE RELUCTANT ZEALOT: Part Ten

The older I get the funnier I find life. Think learning to laugh at oneself must be one of the best gifts Father Time can bestow. At this rate I'll probably be in

hysterics laughing on my deathbed. Which is brilliant – cos life when I came into it and lived it until I was a late teen it wasn't so very funny at all. Most likely the majority of you readers can relate to this.

I came from a small village in the West of Ireland – Eyrecourt. Everyone didn't just know each other, if we didn't know a person's grandparents, they were regarded as 'blow in's'. My own family, the Horsman'swere there since 1650 and had the sheer good luck of owning the flour mill during the Famine years. Bet they were popular!

Growing up in Ireland of the 60's and 70's we had Ipadsand Tablets made of recycled wood – they were called books. Dinner by candlelight wasn't a luxury – it was a necessity because electricity was only installed in the early 70's Our neighbours had a black and white TV with one channel which I used to go in to watch. We teenagers were amazed when we heard' that crowd' up in Dublin had a few channels on their TV's. How did they fit all those programmes at the one time into a telly?

We did have running water – but it was in a stream and had to be brought to the house in two buckets every morning. A wallop of the stick by the local primary school teachers was greeted by seriously angry parents, who added more wallops of their own for getting into trouble in the first place.

But there was fun too. The magic of coming in to a warm firelit kitchen, out of the icycoal blackness of a Winter's night. The terror of ghost stories brought even more vividly to life by the creeping shadows and inexplicable Will o the Wisp flying over marshy fields. The banshee howling of a lone fox in the distance. We children knew it was no fox, but the keening of the old knarledharbringer of death and doom – Banshee herself, combing her long white hair and waiting for one of us to catch sight of her – horrific death would follow. COUNCILLORS' QUESTIONS

BRIDE'S GLEN

The attached advert appeared in Wednesday's Irish Times. The making of the road from Wyattville Link Road to Brides Glen Luas Station a public road will hopefully progress the development of a pay and display car park at the Brides Glen Luas Stop. I received the following e-mail from Owen Keegan, County Manager:

The reason for taking these roads in charge are as follows:

1. Road from Wyattville Link Road to Brides Glen Luas Station

Taking this road in charge will facilitate the provision of a bus service to the Bride's Glen Luas Station and allow for the wearing course to be applied to finish the road. It is also required before the Park & Ride facility can be developed. It will facilitate the imposition of pay and display parking charges. The RPA will not proceed with the Park & Ride facility until the road is taken in charge and any on-street parking is subject to pay & display controls.

2. Access Road to Tullyvale Estate

Taking this road in charge will facilitate a wearing course being applied to finish the road and the imposition of pay and display parking controls already approved by the Council.

REPAIR TO SIGNAGE ALONG THE M11

The maintenance of signage on the M11 at Loughlinstown Hospital Roundabout is understood to be the responsibility of the NRA. A letter will be sent to the NRA seeking confirmation on this point and to request the repair of all damaged signage on this section of Motorway.

REMOVAL OF DUMPED RUBBISH ALONG M11

The dumped material consisted of a consignment of timber pallets, dumped and then partially burned out. These have now been removed from the grass verge of the M11.

WORKS AT SHANGANAGH CASTLE

The Parks Department in consultation with the Housing Department are upgrading the facilities around the glass houses and shed to include for a Park Depot. This depot will be better located to service the Parks and Landscape Service needs of the Shankill, Shanganagh areas and is ideally located next to Shanganagh Park. It is also proposed to investigate the possibility of providing allotments and a sports pitch at this location which will further enhance the facilities provided within the park and address a local need for allotment provision. The lands in question are zoned for housing and accordingly any pitch or allotment

letting agreements would be on a temporary basis where there will be a break in the license each year.

PROVISION OF RAILING FROM RATHSALLAGH TO ST. ANNE'S CHURCH, SHANGANAGH ROAD

Traffic Section will place the item of work on its listing of work areas for examination.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT COMMON'S ROAD/SHANGANAGH ROAD

RPS Consulting Engineers are currently developing options at this junction to facilitate pedestrian and cyclist movement across the Shanganagh Rd / Commons Road bridge (in both directions) and on River Road. In tandem, Traffic Section are assessing how these proposals can be best integrated into the existing cycle and pedestrian networks. It is desirable to tie the link into the improvement works advancing on the N11 at the Silver Tassie to provide a route from the Cherrywood area across the N11 / Commons Road / Shanganagh Road linking into the Loughlinstown Linear Park and other amenities in the area e.g. DART. Once an appropriate solution has been identified it will be brought to the Members for their comments.


