
# Keep warm with Soup

As we head into wintry weather we need lots of warm comforting foods. At this time of year root vegetables like carrots, parsnips and turnips are plentiful as well as celery, leeks and onions and these make a cheap, healthy and satisfying soup (*see recipe*).

Add lots of herbs to give extra flavour. Chop up fresh herbs if you have them. Dried herbs are good too but be careful not to add too much as they can taste stronger than fresh ones . Adding garlic, ginger, paprica, or chilli can 'heat up' the flavour of the soup. Dried vegetables known as pulses including various types of dried beans, peas and lentils are rich in protein. Adding them to a soup will make it more nutritious and satisfying. Alternatively add chopped cooked meat such as chicken, turkey, sausage or chirizo to make the soup into a complete meal when eaten with a crusty roll or wholemeal bread.



If you have bread that needs to be used up make crutons with it. Cut the bread into small squares and fry them until brown. Use just enough oil on the pan to make it glossy so the bread squares move around easily and don't get greasy. Alternatively toast the slices of bread until they are brown, allow to cool and cut into small squares.





Sprinkled on top of a bowl of soup before eating it. Add a little grated cheese for a different and tasty finish.

Using a slow cooker allows you to make a lot of soup in one go. If you put it on in the morning you will come home to a hot tasty nourishing soup. If you cook more than enough for one meal, put it into containers and freeze it so you have a quick tasty soup when you need it. When reheating the soup make sure it comes to the boil before eating it.

The recipe here is for a basic vegetable soup.

- You can vary it with different vegetables – potatoes or butternut squash will help thicken the soup. Use the same amount of vegetables to stock as in the recipe.
- To make the stock you can use stock cubes. Follow the instruction on the packet - usually 2 stock cubes to one and a half pints (or one litre) of water. Cooking liquid from potatoes or veg can be used if salt has not been added to the water (it would make the soup too salty).
- Use a small amount of vegetable oil to fry off the veg – measure it into the pan with a spoon so you don't pour in too much. You can omit the butter, the oil will be sufficient to fry off the veg.
- You can make your soup chunky or put it through the blender for a smooth finish.
- When serving it up, put a spoon of creme fraiche on top of each bowl of soup and sprinkle with chopped parsely or your favourite herb for a professional touch!

Remember to eat warm foods like soup to help keep your body temperature up on cold wintry days. Hot food on the inside + thermals on the outside = double insulation in cold weather!

#### HOMEMADE VEGETABLE SOUP

Vegetables are an essential part of a healthy diet but also taste fantastic, especially when made into soup. This soup is very easy to make – even if you have never cooked.

Serves four people

- Ingredients
- 1 Spanish onion
- 1 leek
- 2 medium sized carrots or 1 large carrot
- 2 sticks of celery
- 1 small turnip or ? of a large one
- 1 clove garlic
- Fresh parsley and thyme (you can use dried but fresh always gives a better flavour)
- Olive oil
- Knob of butter
- 1<sup>1</sup>/2 pints vegetable stock

#### Method

- 1 Heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil and a small knob of butter in a large saucepan
- 2 Chop the onion, carrot, celery, leek and turnip into small pieces (about 1 cm cube – although there is no need to be too precise about this)
- 3 Sauté all the vegetables in the oil for 10-15 minutes over a low heat, stirring occasionally
- 4 Then add the chopped clove of garlic, 1 tablespoon of herbs and 1 ? pints of vegetable stock. Vegetable soup can also be made with chicken stock for extra flavour
- 5 Bring the soup to the boil and simmer for about 40 minutes. Taste it to see if it needs extra salt or pepper
- 6 You can eat the soup as it is or cook it for another 20 minutes and liquidise it to make a smooth soup
- 7 Add some chopped fresh parsley and serve.

*Tip:* Vegetables are rich in antioxidants and vitamins but also have an incredible range of textures and flavours that can give a boost to any meal.

# Juhu Masala

On the back of a post holiday credit card bill, I decided that it might be a good idea to forgo a visit to a restaurant this month and explore one of the take-away options available in the neighbourhood. I have long been a fan of **LET'S EAT IN** based the Barbeque Centre. That they couple consistently good dishes with a huge selection of options from across their Chinese, Indian, Thai & Italian menus means that, while their number is not on speed dial yet, I no longer have to provide them with directions for the delivery driver.

A relatively new option in terms of take aways is **JUHU MASALA** which has recently opened in what was previously a Chinese takeout beside the Tyre Centre on the N11. When the menu arrived through the letterbox, I decided to give it a go.

The biggest problem in describing Juhu Masala is how to categorise it. It mixes elements of Chinese, Thai, Indonesian, Korean & Malay cuisines to deliver a menu which they accurately characterise as 'Asian Fusion'. If your standing order is a sweet and sour or a curry, Juhu Masala offers you the opportunity to try something new and very different. The menu extends to 7 starters, 9 mains and various side dishes and accompaniments, each marrying elements of two or more cuisines and available in a choice of meat (beef, duck, chicken, pork, monkfish, prawns or veggie). Unusually, perhaps cruelly for a takeaway, hand-made deserts are also available.

There were 3 of us eating so we ordered a starter each – Momos Pork Dumplings ( $\in$ 5), Lamb Lollies ( $\in$ 5) and

the starter of the day, Ginger & Green Banana Fritters (€5). The three plump dumplings served with a simple dressing were devoured, similarly the minced lamb kebabs served with a mint chutney never stood a chance. The fritterst were also well received but were the last to go - must be a carnivore thing. For mains we choose one of their nightly specials which was a Chickpea and Potato Curry with aubergine, tomato and a red onion side salad (€10), Black Magic with Beef  $(\in 13)$  which is similar to a black bean sauce but with the twist of sweet mango added and a Prawn Sweet Seoul  $(\in 12)$  which was a prawn dish described as a honey curry with an array of herbs and sweet potato and kangkung (very like spinach), We also ordered 2 lemongrass rice and a masala rice as well as some Roti which is an Indian flat bread offered here as an alternative to naan. All were excellent. There is something very different about the dishes from Juhu. They are light and fragrant, delicate even. I would compare it most to Thai food rather that Indian or Chinese. The special chickpea curry was gorgeous the chickpeas were nice and firm not overcooked as you usually find when used in a curry and the salad that went with it had a lovely fresh tomato taste. The good thing about eating with a group is you get to try everything and I was equally as impressed with the Black Magic and the Sweet Seoul dishes. We finished our meal with a Madagascar Chocolate brownie ( $\in$ 3), Lime and Ginger Cheesecake (€3) and Rich Chocolate Mousse ( $\in$ 3). The Mousse came out as the clear favourite; mind you all plates were cleared!

It seems that an emphasis is placed on the quality and freshness of ingredients. The beef is indicated as Irish fillet and the chicken is certified organic. Their monkfish, something usually reserved for restaurants, is delivered directly from Dunmore East twice weekly and artificial flavourings and preservatives are outlawed. This attention to detail is not lost in the end product.

A meal for 3 came to  $\leq 66$  - a few euro more than you would pay for a fish supper but not expensive for the restaurant standard food received.

#### Graffiti

The programme for graffiti removal continues during 2011 throughout the County. To date the Council has removed 3,172 Sqm of graffiti from public areas around the County. In addition, a substantial amount of graffiti is now being removed by local residents and Tidy Towns Groups. The Council continues to encourage and work with these groups to address the problem of graffiti in their areas. Assistance is provided by way of graffiti-removal kits, paint and equipment, etc.

#### **Dog Control Policy**

A group was established to examine issues relating to dog control in the County. The group met on a number of occasions and at the most recent meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> September

2011, and it was agreed at the meeting to proceed in the short term as follows:-Continue to monitor use of off-leash areas in Parks and Killiney Beach and consider

other off-leash areas for 2012 (subject to finance). Retain the current Parks and Beach bye-laws and review the success or otherwise of

existing off-leash areas before considering any new proposals. Continue to research and investigate associated health related issues and continue

communications with relevant groups and experts.

Foster responsible dog ownership by providing training by DSPCA in a number of Parks.

In the meantime, it was agreed that there was no benefit in the group continuing to meet.

With the agreement of the Area Committees, it is proposed to continue the roll out of off-leash areas in local parks (subject to finance) and continued monitoring of the off-leash area on Killiney Beach

#### CONSERVATION REPORT: FAMINE CEMETERY/WORKHOUSE BESIDE LOUGHLINSTOWN HOSPITAL

Although undoubtedly of local historical and heritage importance there is no official legislative designation available that could cover the famine graveyard at the site adjacent to St. Colmcille's Hospital Loughlinstown. The graveyard does not fit the criteria to be listed as a Protected Structure and it is also of too recent origin to be considered under Archaeological designations. However, the issue of retaining the graveyard is addressed in current Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown development plan, which contains a specific local objective that relates to this site. It is Specific Local Objective 43 - "To retain the famine graveyard on the site adjacent to St Colmcille's Hospital".



### **Road Safety – Driving on the Motorways and Winter Preparations**

The Motorways of Ireland have vastly improved over the past number of years. While driving on the motorways please remember:

- To Drive within your own ability, the speed limit is not a target to be exceeded it is the maximum speed allowed. Your speed should also reflect traffic and driving conditions at time of driving.
- Your are obliged to drive on the left, the outer lane is an overtaking lane; on three lane motorways the left lane is the driving lane, the other two are for overtaking always return to your left when you have completed your overtaking manoeuvre.
- Never stop on a lane of the motor way never stop in the centre island. If you need to repair a puncture always go to the hard shoulder on the left or if possible exit the motor way to services area.
- Remember to be courteous to other drivers, we all make

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mistakes, be alert to all possibilities as different drivers are a various stages of their driving careers.

- Everyone should have a seat belt, the driver should not have possession of any phone or electrical device while driving, never drink and drive and even in heavy motorway traffic concentrate on your driving not on reading the newspaper or fixing your make-up.
- Do not get involved with drivers who engage in dangerous driving; note the registration number of the vehicle, the colour, the make, a description of the driver and place of driving including date day and time. You can report the incident to your local Garda Station or to

who will arrange for the matter to be fully investigated.

#### FOR WINTER DRIVING

Please ensure your car is fully serviced, check and check car equipment wheel brace, car jack and spare wheel. You should also have a reflective Jacket, Torch, car phone charger, First Aid kit and reflective triangle.

#### DAILY CHECKS

Tyre depth, water in washer bottle, oil, petrol and Bulbs should be checked daily especially with longer colder evenings.

Try to have your car washed and waxed before the winter as this reduces the effects the winter weather has on visibility out of your car and the effect the weather has on the appearance of your car.

# SHANKILL CLASSICAL MUSIC CLUB

# Franz Líszt (1811-1886)

The October meeting marked the anniversary of Franz Liszt, born two hundred years ago this month. He is best known as a composer for the piano, and not surprisingly John O'Hagan included a selection from the massive and very varied piano repertoire. But Liszt was an innovator in many other ways, and the programme aimed to illustrate some of these. It also drew attention to his practice of making several versions or arrangements of many of his pieces, often with different instrumentation from the original.

The piano pieces ranged from the introspective late Nuages gris (played by Sergio Fiorentino), through one of the many piano transcriptions of other composers' works (a movement from Beethoven's fifth symphony, played by Cyprien Katsaris), and one of the operatic paraphrases (on Verdi's Rigoletto, in a remarkable 1911 recording by Vladimir de Pachmann) to the zany exhibitionistic Grand galop chromatique, the piece with which Liszt often finished the solo recitals around which he built his early touring career. This last was played by the flamboyant Hungarian Gyorgy Cziffra. The Hungarian angle also turned up in the best-known of the Hungarian Rhapsodies, No 2, from a concert by the Gipsy-influenced Lakatos Ensemble, complete with cimbalom and fiddles, recalling the style of music in the taverns of Liszt's time.

Liszt's vocal music is not so well known. We heard Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, accompanied by Daniel Barenboim, in one of the more romantic of his seventy or

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so songs, O lieb, so lang du lieben kannst, better known in its later transcription for solo piano as Liebestraum No 3. The mood was altogether more sombre in an excerpt from the choral work *Via crucis*. This spare and stark work is a setting for soloists, choir and organ of the fourteen Stations of the Cross. It was composed in 1878-79, with Liszt's touring days as a virtuoso long past, and reflects his increasing absorption in religion and his detachment from the celebrity which

continued to surround him. The recording was by a group of Hungarian musicians conducted by Miklos Szabo. The short Consolation No 3, also better-known as a solo piano piece, but here played by Guido Schiefen and Eric Le Van in a cello and piano arrangement by a contemporary of Liszt, was a quiet interlude before the evening finished with the only orchestral work, one of the thirteen symphonic poems – another format invented by Liszt himself. This was the dramatic *Hamlet*, played by the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, conducted by Kurt Masur.

# **CITIZENS INFORMATION NEWS**



#### THE MEDICAL CARD



A medical card issued by the Health Service Executive (HSE) allows the holder to receive certain health services free of charge. It is means tested. Medical cards are

small plastic cards (similar in size to a credit card). Your medical card will show your doctor's name. It is usually issued for a year, after which it is reviewed.

Medical card holders pay the Universal Social Charge on their income (except for social welfare and HSE payments), but at a maximum rate of 4%. They may also be exempt from paying State exam fees in publicly-funded second-level schools. There may also be financial help with buying school books in certain schools.

If you have a medical card, you are entitled to: Free GP (family doctor) services; Prescribed drugs and medicines (with some exceptions); In-patient public hospital services, out-patient services and medical appliances; Dental, optical and aural services; Maternity and infant care services; Some personal and social care services, for example, public health nursing, social work services and other community care services.

To qualify for a medical card your weekly income must be below a certain figure for your family size (decided by Dept. of Social Protection). Cash income, savings, investments and property (except for your own home) are taken into account in the means test. Lone parents with dependants are assessed under the income limits for couples.

Normally, your total income is taken into account in the means test for the medical card. There are different guidelines for those aged under 70 years and those aged over 70 years. According to the HSE's guidelines, if your income is derived solely from Social Welfare allowances or benefits or HSE allowances you should be granted a medical card even though your payment is in excess of the Income Guidelines for your age and situation. The assessment of a couple for medical card purposes is based on the age of the older person. All capital (savings and investments) is taken into account for medical card purposes for the under 70s. However, income on the savings/investments or property of €36,000 for a single person and €72,000 for a couple is disregarded. In essence, only the interest or income earned on savings and similar investments will be counted as income, not the total value of the savings or investments themselves.

#### OVER 70S: GUIDELINE ON INCOME AND CAPITAL

Since January 2009 there are **gross** income limits of  $\in$ 700 per week for a single person and  $\in$ 1,400 per week for a married or cohabiting couple. There will be no standard deductions allowable (for example, for income tax). However, if your income is over these limits, you can still apply for the ordinary medical card or GP Visit Card: for example, if you have high medical expenses, such as paying for a nursing home.

Pensions, earnings, interest from capital and all other sources of income are included in the means test. Savings or similar investments of  $\in$  36,000 for a single person and  $\in$  72,000 for a couple are disregarded. A notional rate of

interest will be applied to the balance. Income will not be assessed from property (whether a family home, a holiday home or any other property) unless it is generating a rental income. Where one spouse is aged over 70 years and the other spouse is aged under 70 years, they will both qualify for a medical card if their income is below 1,400 a week.

You can apply online for a medical card on **www.medicalcard.ie**. This is the quickest method of obtaining the card. Alternatively, you can download a medical card application form:

**Form MC1** - for people aged **under 70 years** and people aged over 70 whose income is above the  $\notin 700/1,400$  limit.

**Form MC1A** - for those aged **over 70** whose income is below the  $\notin 700/1,400$  weekly income limit.

You complete the form and bring it to the GP you have chosen from the list of participating doctors. If the GP accepts you as a patient, he/she signs the form. Your employer also has to sign the form and certify your earnings, or, if you are claiming a social welfare payment, the form has to be stamped at the Social Welfare Local Office. You should return the form to the HSE Central MedicalCard Office, Client Registration Unit, P.O Box 11745, Finglas, Dublin 11.

Contact your local health centre or Local Health Office if you have any questions about medical cards and eligibility. You can also contact the HSE Info line: Callsave 1850 24 1850.

#### ODOUR CONTROL SYSTEMS AT THE SHANGANAGH WASTE TREATMENT CENTRE

The design, build and operate contract for the Upgrade of the Shanganagh Wastewater Treatment Works being undertaken by SDD Ltd requires a high level of treatment of odours both during construction and in the Operation and Maintenance phase. In order to achieve this, all processes are to be covered and ventilated through an odour treatment system. Construction works are ongoing with completion programmed for Spring 2012. SDD will then be operating the upgraded plant for a period of up to twenty years.

The commissioning of the upgraded works is being undertaken in four distinct phases. Phase One is the pretreatment process and was completed last year without any major odour issues occurring. The second phase of commissioning is currently nearing completion. This involves bringing the 'primary and secondary treatment processes' on line. It was during the commissioning of this phase of the Works that we had equipment failure, including the odour control units, which prevented the odours created during the process being adequately treated. The Contractor is currently working towards commencing phases 3 and 4, which relate to the sludge treatment process and are due to commence end of September/early October.

Phase 2 started on 4th July when the flows from the pretreatment building were sent into the primary and secondary treatment units for the first time. These processes typically take 4-8 weeks to build up secondary sludge, during which time malodours can be generated and require treating. These odours will subsequently decrease when the process stabilises. As with all newly commissioned equipment failures can occur, as they did at Shanganagh, which caused the release of untreated odours. In addition to general equipment failure, the Contractor following a review of the Odour Control Units, found a fundamental fault with their construction. This necessitated SDD to invest in the procurement of temporary replacement units to treat the odours being generated.

At the Council's insistence SDD were required to immediately put in place an Action Plan to address all the issues associated with the generation, treatment and discharge of odours. This action plan was overseen by the resident engineering staff on site together with the Council's technical consultants. The Action Plan consisted of modifying the operation of the process to reduce the level of odours whilst the problem with the odour system was identified. A bypass odour control system consisting of the temporary odour control units being installed and which will remain in place until the original designed system has been rectified and thoroughly tested to ensure that it operates to the required standard. With the temporary units now in place we have seen an immediate reduction in even the smallest levels of odours being released from the stacks. However, there were some higher odour levels experienced as one system was taken off line

and the new system brought into action. In addition, SDD have brought extra resources into their Operation and Commissioning teams to address any future odour issues.

The contract with SDD requires that a comprehensive system be put in place to measure and record odours (if any) at various locations around the site. The contractor is carrying out continuous monitoring of air outlet stacks. Levels of odour are measured every 15 minutes in all three stacks and at four locations on the boundary of the plant. In addition, monitoring is conducted on individual process lines twice a day to evaluate the performance of the odour control system.

After all the processes are fully commissioned there will be a three month period, in early 2012, when all processes are tested to ensure that everything is functioning correctly and in compliance with the contract and Environmental Protection Agency's requirements i.e. that there are no odours from the plant beyond the perimeter of the treatment plant site.



### **COUNCILLORS' QUESTIONS Councillor Carrie Smyth**

#### SHANGANAGH TREATMENT PLANT **UP-GRADE**

Residents of certain areas surrounding the Shanganagh Treatment Plant have received update letters from Sisk, Dragados and Drace (SDD Construction Joint Venture), regarding the odour during the commissioning works.

The problem of odour has improved in the last couple of weeks. Should you have a problem with odour or any other problem please lo call 1890252793 contact Siobhan on and http://www.shanganaghbray.com

I raised the following items with Frank Austin, Director of Services of the Water and Waste Department:

- Q: Is testing been completed on the smell to see if it is a danger to humans etc.?
- A: SDD has been monitoring the concentrations of the principal sewage derived gases at the site. All of this is examined by Council staff on site.

SDD have assured the Council that in no case have the gases released from the plant reached any levels which could have an implication on the health of the nearby residents.

Q: Some areas affected by the odour have received no correspondence/notice from SDD Construction Joint Venture i.e. Hazelwood, Shankill.

A: These are the following areas that were distributed to by SDD: Shanganagh Cliffs, Brookdene, Cois Culainn, Cromlech Fields, Castle Court, Bayview, Seafield Court, Bayshore Lane Printed 1350 letters for distribution, but did not include Hazelwood, SDD are to review the areas and addresses for future

- leaflet drops. Q: Are the distributors of the correspondence/notice ignoring junk mail notices?
- A: The distribution company respects resident's wishes and do not post leaflets where there is a 'No Junk Mail' sign. SDD will review this.
- Q: What is the cost to residents who ring the 1890.252.793 number?
- A: Lo-call charge applies (Calls to 1890 numbers are charged per minute, normally at local call rates for fixed line providers. note that the rates charged for the use of 1890 (LoCall) numbers may vary among different service providers.)

#### OLCOVAR, DUBLIN ROAD, SHANKILL, CO. DUBLIN.

On 1st July 2011 statutory notice was given in the Irish Times of the Council's proposal to take the above road in charge, and to declare the road to be a public road. Maps and schedule were available for inspection for one month.

No objections to the proposed declarations have been received and accordingly it is recommended that the road within the above mentioned estate should be declared a public road and the estate taken in charge.

Accordingly, it is recommended that the following resolution is passed by the Council:

#### Provision of Allotments/Community Garden on Land to the Rear of Assumpta Park

A Community Garden can be considered at this location if there is a group which is prepared to take on the development of the site with the support of the Council.

#### UPDATE ON ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

Over the past number of years, the Council's Environment Culture & Community Department has strived to improve the overall cleanliness of the county. As a result of a number of initiatives there has been a significant improvement throughout the County. These improvements have been reflected in the recent IBAL report, which saw Dún Laoghaire go from 16th place in the rankings in 2010 to 9th this year with continued improvement in Tidy Districts and Tidy Towns.

#### **CLEANSING SECTION**

The street cleaning schedule continues to operate. From February to the end of September the schedule aims to clean the majority of estates on a monthly basis and the main roads fortnightly and from October onwards the focus changes to removing leaves from the roadways and footpaths. Gully cleaning and weed control continue throughout the year.

#### **ENVIRONMENT AWARENESS**


The Environmental Awareness Officer continues to ensure that a comprehensive programme of education and information is provided on waste management and litter control, in particular waste prevention and minimization. Under this programme the Environmental Awareness Officer continues to work closely with schools by supporting projects such as "Green Schools". The Environmental Awareness Officer also has continued to work closely with community groups/resident associations in organising clean-ups in their areas and encouraging them to become involved in creating a litter free environment in their areas.

#### Tidy Districts and Tidy Towns

A record number of community groups (42) entered this year's Tidy Districts Awards, including a number of groups who are new to the awards. Over the past year, the Environmental Awareness Officer has worked closely with Tidy Towns groups throughout the county, providing assistance and advice This has resulted in new residents' committees forming, the re-formation of Dún Laoghaire Tidy Towns Committee and two new Tidy Towns Committees in Stillorgan and Foxrock being formed. The marks of every entrant in the Tidy Towns Competition increased this year with both Dalkey and Shankill each winning bronze medals.

#### Litter Control

The Council's Litter Wardens continue to target litter black-spots in the County. They have also increased their patrols on beaches and popular dog-walking areas to ensure that dog-walkers comply with the provisions of the Litter Pollution Acts in relation to dog-fouling. 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




#### **OPEN NIGHT**


