COOKERY CORNER



Apricot chicken

Serves 4

8 Chicken pieces 500g can apricot nectar/crushed can apricots 1pkt French onion soup 1 brown onion, diced

Place chicken pieces in a casserole dish with soup and onion and season with sea salt and pepper. Add apricot nectar and stir, alternatively if using can of apricots crush with potato masher before you mix with other ingredients. Cover and bake in 180° for 1½ hrs.

Caramel Ginger Tarts

Makes 12



12 ginger nut bickies 400g can condensed milk 1/2 cup (125ml) cream, whipped 1 banana

Place unopened tin of condensed milk into a large saucepan generously covering tin with water, boil for 2 ½ hours to turn the milk into caramel, (check every 30 minutes to ensure tin is covered in water, top up when necessary so the tin doesn't burst). Meanwhile place cookies on the individual circles of a patty cake tin and bake in 150C oven for 10 minutes. Remove and gently mould the softened biscuits into patty cake shells. When cool, add enough cooled caramel to fill biscuit. Top with whipped cream and a slice or two of banana as garnish.

Labour Party Local Representative for the Shankill area, Councillor Denis O'Callaghan, who is Vice Chair and a member of the Dublin Mid Leinster Regional





Health Forum, tabled a Motion on the matter calling on the Chief Executive Officer not to proceed with the sale. (See Report below). Separately Councillor O'Callaghan and Councillor Carrie Smyth sought a meeting with the Local Area Manager, HSE, Mr Gerard McKiernan to discuss the matter.

Councillor O'Callaghan collected a Petition from the residents of Shankill in protest over the sale of the Health Centre and adjoining lands and he handed in the Petition to the HSE Offices in Bray on Tuesday July 27th at 11am. A sincere thank you to all the residents who signed the Petition and contacted the HSE.

Councillors O'Callaghan and Smyth said "The people in the area are shocked and appalled that their health services are under threat.

"We want the best possible health centre located in Shankill and so do the people who are contacting us on a daily basis".

Councillors O'Callaghan and Smyth met with the Local Area Manager HSE Mr Gerard McKiernan and the Assistant National Director HSE Estates, at their Offices in Bray on Thursday July 29th at 1pm.

During the course of the meeting Councillors O'Callaghan and Smyth stressed the fear and anxiety of the people of Shankill that they may lose their Health Centre. What the people want is for the HSE to upgrade the existing Health Centre to provide a modern health facility to cater for the needs of an expanding population into the future.

REGIONAL HEALTH FORUM DUBLIN-MID LEINSTER

Motion - Cllr Denis O'Callaghan

That the HSE report on all aspects of the proposed sale of HSE owned lands consisting of the site encompassing Shankill Health Centre and associated lands at Lower Road, Shankill, Co Dublin including a site map, and that this Health Forum expresses serious concern regarding the proposal to develop a new Health Centre through a Private Public Partnership.

Reply

: I attach herewith brochure for the sale of the Shankill Health Centre and site map outlining the extent of HSE lands around the health centre.

It should be noted that the sale is conditional on the site being redeveloped for "Primary Care Health Use".

Shankill was one of the locations for which expressions of interest were sought for the provision of Primary Care infrastructure in July 2008. A number of submissions were received of which two submitted priced offers for the provision of Primary Care accommodation.

One of these offers was rejected because the price offered exceeded the level of rent that the HSE could pay. The second site was not selected because of its location on the periphery of the catchment area for the Primary Care Team.

In the meantime, a number of parties expressed an interest in developing the existing health centre site for Primary Care and because of this interest, the HSE has decided to offer the site for sale by public tender, on the condition that the site is developed for "Primary Care Health Use"



The magnitude of memories

However, the facility I work in as a Ward Manager - Leopardstown Park Hospital in Foxrock - has a very proactive 'Multidisciplinary Team ' ethos. Leopardstown Park isn't an institution someone is being 'put into'. It's a real 'home from home' that one comes to when they can no longer look after themselves. As we would with our own elderly family members - we do our level best to ensure personal independence and autonomy are encouraged and respected. The hospital caters for approximately 180 long term residents and 180 people avail of our Day Unit services.

Our Nursing Management Team (headed by Elaine Flanagan Acting Director of Nursing) is reputed to be amongst the most highly skilled in the country. The nurses and Health Care Assistants (HCA's) receive regular update training, and the hospital is very careful when taking on staff. Dr Joseph Yazbeck, our Hospital Chief Medical Officer is also a lecturer in UCD. We have Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy (O.T), a Dietician, Speech and Language Therapist, Medical Social Worker, onsite Pharmacist, and podiatrist. A visiting dentist and optician complete the team.

And yet, despite all of our combined knowledge and team effort, at seventy four, 'young Dympna' just wasn't gelling. She was in a room with three others cos we were told she liked

company. She was disturbingly anorexic in her appitite and conversation.

Having been in hospital for quite a while she was very underweight and weak I got our dietician involved, with little success.

Because of being in bed for so long in the hospital her joints and muscles were a bit compromised, so I got our Physiotherapy involved. She still wasn't moving as much as she should have been.

Worried that her teeth, eyesight or feet might be bothering her I got the dentist, podiatrist and Optician involved. That still didn't solve the problem.

Thinking that we might have missed something religious I got our hospital chaplin involved.

And here we were, two months into her stay with us. Every avenue of our expertise exhausted – and for some bloody reason the woman wasn't responding. Having outruled every possible cause for bad health we could, I was getting really frustrated. She wasn't gaining weight; she wasn't talking to either staff or the other residents. What the hell was wrong with her?

Then it happened.

As anything magnitudinal that ever appears to happen in life it happened totally accidently.

One of my HCA's was going on holidays and had no travel iron for ironing her clothes. Having an innate hatred of anything domestic – including ironing, my off spring love giving me unusual presents, one of the sons had bought me a travel iron dated to look like those used in the 1970's. I was totally happy to give my HCA my one. It was sitting on the desk at the nurse's station for her to collect.

Katie was being wheeled to the



Day Room and spotted it. For the first time since she came to the ward she instigated a conversation. 'That's not a great power watt iron, but it's got a good base. Do you find it good on steam?' On and on she chatted, discussing the merits of various irons etc.

It then dawned on me what she'd been missing – the tools of her trade as a housewife! This woman had come in to stay with us – as – perceivably her last home. We had done everything we could for her professionally. But what I didn't know was that she was very house proud. And she'd loved ironing. Since she'd come in to us she'd never seen a sweeping brush, a hoover or an iron!

Our O.T department makes great use of 'reminiscence' groups, where they have the old ceramic hot water bottles, glass milk bottles and even an old bike. These are used as 'memory prompters' for conversation.

And this leads up to the appeal I'm now going to make. The HSE funds us for the most basic provisions, beds, nursing care etc, etc. But there's no allowance for any 'extras' like nice curtains, duvets, TV's etc. . . . If any of you have items from the 40's to the 70's – give me a shout. I'd like to set up a' memory corner' on my ward for our residents to enjoy and discuss amongst themselves.

Also, come support us at our ANNUAL GARDEN FETE 13:00hrs to 17:00hrs. Sunday 12th September. It's always a really popular venue for people to attend each year with so many stalls, homemade confectionary, plants, bric a brac and children's entertainment – and the old world charm of our fantastic grounds.





COUNCIL APPROVES €124,000 IN GRANTS FOR LOCAL BUSINESS GROUPS ACROSS DÚN LAOGHAIRE-RATHDOWN

Grants to the total of €124,250 were awarded to the eleven successful applicants to the Council's new Business Support Grants.

The approved grants will support projects such as the development of a Christmas Festival and street entertainment in Shankill; marketing of a new animated film competition to be showcased in Blackrock; a new website for Sandyford Business Estate retailers; a new garden area in Dundrum for outdoor, community-based activities; enhanced public spaces in Dalkey to facilitate markets and street performance; and a marketing campaign to attract cruise operators to Dún Laoghaire Harbour and Town.

The Fund totals €300,000 with each of the six electoral areas of the County eligible for up to 50,000 in support, and the Council will advertise a second round of funding early in August. A total of fifteen applications were received.

CONCERNS OVER SALE OF SHANKILL HEALTH CENTRE LANDS

Local Shankill Labour Councillor and Vice Chairman of the Dublin-Mid Leinster Regional Health Forum Denis O'Callaghan has expressed serious concerns at a proposal by the HSE to offer for sale by public tender lands which encompass Shankill Health Centre. The overall size of the site including the Health Centre is 0.19ha (0.48 acres). It is due to be sold by public tender on the 29th of July 2010.

Councillor O'Callaghan said he is opposed to a public private partnership in this instance. He was speaking on a motion tabled by him at the monthly meeting of the Dublin-Mid Leinster regional Health Forum in Tullamore on Tuesday last.

"While accepting that Shankill Health Centre is in need of upgrading a public private partnership was not the best was of achieving this. The current health centre and sites are 100% owned by the HSE. To involve a private partnership will leave the HSE long into the future paying an excessively high rent."

"A condition of the proposed sale will be to redevelop a new Medical Centre. One must assume that the new owners of the lands could in the future, through the courts, seek to have the condition removed. The lands in question are zoned residential and are in a prime location.

"I believe the HSE are giving a hostage to fortune in this case. The long term effect will be that the HSE will be paying high rents for a building that they presently own. The logical thing to do would be for the HSE to upgrade the current health centre out of its own funds."

"I have asked the Health Service Executive not to proceed with the sale of the lands at present given the poor value for property in the present economic climate and until a more comprehensive examination of the proposed sale takes place."

"Shankill has been devastated over recent times by the loss of its only shopping centre. It would be disastrous if the community were also to lose their Health Centre because of a decision by the HSE in accordance with Government policy of blindly pursuing public private partnerships.



EXTENSION OF RAILING/HANDGRIP – OUINNS ROAD

The following 4 items of work were required to improve the access to the Beach at Quinn's Road:

- Strengthen the ramp as it was undermined by the elements. This was deemed priority as if the ramp failed it could lead to serious injury and no access to the Beach for a considerable period of time.
- Remove the water flowing down the ramp as this lead to a slippy surface on the ramp.
- Extend the ramp to the Beach, as the jumping or climbing of the platform to gain access to the Beach involved a drop of over 0.5 meters in places.
- Provide a handrail at the existing steps at the top of the access

The first three of these works were undertaken in April and May this year, using up the available budget for work at this location. Estimates of the fourth item have been prepared and the cost is not substantial. If the money is available towards the end of the year, this work will be undertaken; if the money is not available this work will be added to the proposed works for 2011.

Note: On the 10th August Dara Mc Gowan informed the Council hope to appoint a contractor to install the railing in the next week or two to the complete the works. The work hopefully will be completed by the end of August.

SHANGANAGH WASTEWATER TREATMENT WORKS

The contract for the design, construction and operation of the upgrade of the Shanganagh Wastewater Treatment Works was awarded to SDD Shanganagh (Water Treatment) Ltd in September 2008 and works commenced on 20th October 2008.

The contract construction period is 30 months at a construction tender cost of €72.7m.

Work is progressing well on site. Phase 1, the construction of the new Pre-treatment building, is substantially complete and Phase 2, the diversion of flows to this new building and the demolition of the old inlet works has commenced. Following this, Phase 3 will commence later this summer which involves the remaining construction of the treatment processes and commissioning of the works. Currently the contract is on schedule for completion by this time next year.

Associated with the upgrade of the treatment works is a separate contract (SBMDS Contract 2 - Transfer Pipeline) which includes for the construction of the pipeline from Bray Pumping Station to Shanganagh, along with the stormwater storage tank at the old Bray Golf course. Approval to go to tender has been received from the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government. Tenders are due by early September and it is anticipated that the contractor will start works on site in early 2011 (14 month construction period).

The Aertel page 630 contains information on DLR emergency updates Council news, water of notice, traffic, DLR events and contact details.

UP DATE - REMOVAL OF HOG WEED

The contractor engaged by the Parks Department is currently using control measures against Hogweed in areas under our control in Loughlinstown.

However we are aware that there is also Hogweed growth along the Shanganagh River in private lands (Cherrywood), where we are not in a position to undertake control measures.

We will continue to monitor the position.



"Dublin's Fighting Story 1916-1921 – Told By The Men Who Made It" Published by the Mercier Press Review by James Scannell

This remarkable and fascinating book was first published in 1948 as part of a series of 4 books dealing with the War of Independence published between 1947 – 1948 based on the very popular 'Fighting Stories' series of articles published in The Kerryman newspaper has now been re-published by the Mercier Press with a new 2009 Introduction. A unique feature of this book is that it predates the depositions later collected by the Bureau of Military History which were released into the public domain a few years and used by the authors of a number of recent books.

In a new preface to this unique book, series Editor Dr. Brian Ó Conchurbhair provides the reader with the background and history of this book and those of the 3 companion volumes - *Kerry's Fighting Story, Rebel Cork's Fighting Story, Limerick's Fighting Story* - revealing that in the late 1940's plans to published a fifth title, Tipperary's Fighting Story, never materialised even through appeals for recollections and photographs were made at that time. Dr. Ó Conchurbhair closes his introduction by reminding the reader that as we approach the centenaries of 1916 Rising, the War of Independence, the Anglo-Irish Treaty and Civil War, it is appropriate that these texts again become part of the wider public debate and discussion on these key events.

In a special Introduction to this 2009 edition, Professor Diarmaid Ferriter provides an overview of the key events in Ireland between 1913 and 1921 for the benefit of those who are not familiar with this period of our history and is then followed by the key sections covering -

- How the Fight Began
- The Great Dublin Strike and Lockout, 1913
- The 1916 Rising
- The Executed Leaders
- The War of Independence beginning with Frongoch University and the key events in the War of Independence 1919 1921 events after those who were imprisoned after the Rising were released ______

from internment.

The are accounts of Bloody Sunday, the Battle of Brunswick Street, the Burning of the Customs House, Escape from Mountjoy, the role of I.R.A. Intelligence and how it operated, the role of women in addition to accounts of various events, engagements, actions and incidents in and around Dublin City and County with a several pages dealing with events and incidents in and around Shankill which contains several unique revelations that many people may not be aware of.

The book, which contains first hand accounts by participants of the events listed in the Contents, provides the reader with hands on accounts of what it was like to take part in these events and recent other books

published by Mercier Press on various aspects the War of Independence in the Dublin Area, provide excellent scope for further readings.

All in all the re-publication by Mercier Press of *Dublin's Fighting Story* is to be welcomed as it contains a first hand account of this period in our history and details of events and people which are not mentioned or referred to in other books.

A Cherrywood Luas to Shankill Walkway and Cycle Way

As the crow flies, Cherrywood Luas Station is 1200 metres (that is three quarters of a mile and a brisk 10 minute walk) from St. Anne's National School in Shankill. However if you were to walk it the only way possible it would be over three kilometres. This is illustrated in Figure 1.



Figure 1 – Luas Terminus Proximity to Population

Not only this, but a major accident and emergency hospital, Saint Columcille's in Loughlinstown is a mere 600 metres as the crow flies, from the terminus. That is a six minute walk but again the long way around is over three times that.

The problem is, of course, that

the Shanganagh river valley is in the way and the only way to get to the other side, assuming you are not a crow, is via Wyattville bridge. You may well wonder how we managed to build an an expensive piece of transport infrastructure all the way to the edge of a cliff, without at least considering the possibility of making it a bit more accessible to a major hospital such as Loughlinstown, and a major population centre, such as Shankill. However, while you are wondering this, I suggest you also ponder how we managed to build the same Luas to within 600 metres of a Quality Bus corridor without going the extra six tenths of a mile to connect them up. (You may even conclude that what is missing is Joined Up Thinking.)

But anyway. Enough bemoaning where we are at and on with a rather elegant solution. The Shanganagh Valley Viaduct, built many years ago for the Harcourt Street line, is still intact, and elegantly bridges the Shanganagh River Valley. So why not create a busway, cycleway and walkway, from the Luas terminus over the viaduct as far as the hospital and then create a walkway and cycleway along the alignment of the old Harcourt Street Line all the way to Shankill village – or at least Stonebridge Road. This last part will require a new footbridge over the M11. All of this is illustrated in Figure 3.

So what are the objections. I must say that I find it hard to see many, but there is one that is worth considering and that I

will propose an innovative solution for. That objection is the view that may be taken that a walkway and cycleway such as that proposed may result in anti-social behaviour. The proposed walkway and cycleway will indeed pass by the rear gardens of a number of

houses. However, speaking as someone who lives near a similar walkway, that at the back of Shankill Dart between Corbawn Lane and Shanganagh Cliffs, incidents of anti social behaviour are quite rare. In any case, I would suggest the following approach to essentially eliminate any chance of this.

A part of this plan, encourage the development of mews houses in the gardens of those houses with back gardens backing onto the proposed walkway and cycleway. In order to do this, the walkway and cycleway would also be a cul-desac road to facilitate vehicular access. In this way objections from landowners will be minimised if not eliminated as they are unlikely to object to a plan that gives them a site at the end of their gardens. If you look at Google Earth, you will see that most of the gardens are fairly substantial and have plenty of room for a mews house at the end. I must say also, that the houses in question have all had their value adversely impacted by the criss crossing of two motorways in the vicinity, so a bit of good luck on the planning permission front by the owners would probably be appreciated.

In any case, the Dun Laoghaire County Development Plan calls for the development of Mews Roads to be encouraged, as indeed for the general densification of development in the county. Densification is particularly encouraged near to good public transport.

My own view of allowing Mews developments on the walkway, is that it is likely to make the walkway and cycleway more pleasant and indeed safer and I think it is to be encouraged.

So to a little more detail on the busway. I would suggest that Bus Trams be used. A bustram is basically a Luas on rubber wheels with similar carrying capacity. If you are interested in reading more about bus trams, I suggest you go to wikipedia and search for articles on Curitiba, the Brazilian city where the concept was pioneered.

I can envisage a bus tram running from the Luas terminus, over the viaduct and into the hospital, and from there via the Loughlinstown roundabout and Commons Road to Shankill Dart station. Thereby joining up two very expensive pieces of transport infrastructure. Other buses could run to other points in Shankill, Bray, Greystones and beyond. This would of course give us a Joined Up transport system and indeed – joined up thinking.

So what to do next. Well I suggest the simplest thing to do is to go to my blog at www.shanehayes.info and leave a comment of support, and of course, petition your TDs and Councillors.

Depending on the reaction I might organise a public meeting or some such.


In the boys' competition, St. Anne's ran out winners after impressive victories. Rathmichael and Scoil Mhuire provided stubborn resistance but St.

Sheeba's Gone - May She Woof in Peace

It took almost a year of family arguments, children's accusations of us wanting to commit 'murder', and Sheeba, our much loved and of much resented 'granny' falling down the garden stairs, walking into furniture and senile barking before we finally took what many would call the right step. This morning we took her to the vet and had her put



to sleep. Were we right in making the decision over life and death?. Or did we leave it too long, had we prolonged our gentle best friends suffering in our procrastination hoping that she'd do the decent thing herself and just keel over and die?.

The five us us went into the vets surgery acutely aware that only four of us would be coming out. Sheeba, unable to walk because of severe arthritis was being carried by David, our sixteen year old son,and Sheeba's closest family member. He'd known her all his life. Being blind and deaf, Sheeba just hung limply in his arms - she trusted him implicitly.

Once the vet had examined her and told us she had kidney failure, heart failure and was severely malnourished due to her decreased apitite I started to feel a little better about what was about to happen. She was placed on the surgery table and as her family surrounded her, holding her paw, rubbing her back and for me - balefully watching the veterinary nurse hold her head (if she made one wrong move - she was cat meat!), the vet loaded up the syringe of anaesthetic he was to inject.

I stopped him before he started to administer. 'Will she feel anything, will she gasp for air, will there be any suffering, will she...?'. He answered the questions well and introduced the needle into the paw I was holding. As I watched the plunger depress, emptying it's lethal contents into the most loyal and undemanding friend I've ever known my heart was racing. Hubby, Katie and David were crying and the nurse in me took over. I watched her closely for any signs of struggle as she lay there breathing quietly, there was nothing, one second she was breathing, the next gone.

It felt so peaceful, and after all the guilt and recriminations - so right. We had repaid our pals years of loyalty by giving her the gift of release from all her suffering and a dignified death. As I sit here alone by my computer, where she and I have always kept each other company the tears are falling. Towards the end, because

she had started annoying the hell out of me by barking non stop to be picked up and carried to her water bowl, and had ruined many a carpet because of her onset of incontinence I had started deeply resenting her. My campaign to get her put down now rose questions as to my real motives. Was it to put her out of her suffering - or to get rid of the nuisence she'd

become in her infirmity? In the end - the vets asurances that she was suffering and that we were right to do what we were doing assuaged the guilt. But I still can't help wondering.

I get up from the computer because it's time to refill Sheeba's water bowl. She gets so thirsty with her heavy panting lately, she's always thirsty. As I go to pour the water automatically from the glass to the bowl I stop in confusion. It's still full from this morning. And then I remember.
